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Independent Auditors' Report

Board of County Commissioners Union County, Florida

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of Union County, Florida (the "County"), as of and for the year ended September 30, 2012, which collectively comprise the County's basic financial statements, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the County's management. Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements, based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as, evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

Management has not acquired an actuarial valuation to determine the amount of its OPEB (Other Postemployment Benefits) liability and has not presented such liability in its government-wide financial statements as required by accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The impact of such departure from generally accepted accounting principles to the liabilities, net assets and expenditures of the government-wide financial statements of Union County is unknown. Such departure has no impact on the County's fund financial statements.

In our opinion, except for the effects of not recording an OPEB liability in the government-wide financial statements, the financial statements referred to above, present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund and the aggregate remaining fund information of the County as of September 30, 2012, and the respective changes in financial position, for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated June 14, 2013, on our consideration of the County's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

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Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and required supplementary information (RSI) be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the County's financial statements as a whole. The supplemental information is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards and state financial assistance is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations and Florida Statutes, and is also not a required part of the financial statements. The supplemental information and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards and state financial assistance are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplemental information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Union County, Florida's (the "County") discussion and analysis is designed to (a) assist the reader in focusing on significant financial issues, (b) provide an overview of the County's financial activity, (c) identify changes in the County's financial position (its ability to address the next and subsequent year challenges), (d) identify any material deviations from the financial plan (the approved budget), and (e) identify individual fund issues or concerns.

Since the Management's Discussion and Analysis (MD&A) is designed to focus on the current year's activities, resulting changes and currently known facts, please read it in conjunction with the County's financial statements which follow this discussion.

Financial Highlights

- The assets of the County exceeded its liabilities at September 30, 2012 by \$15,737,160 (net assets). Of this amount \$613,668 (unrestricted net assets) may be used to meet the County's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors.
- The County's long-term debt obligations decreased by \$324,785.
- As of September 30, 2012, the County's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$3,151,301. All funds were able to report positive ending fund balances; however fund balances saw a decrease of \$148,456 when compared to prior year. This decrease was anticipated due to budgeted use of reserves.
- The County purchased capital assets of buildings, equipment, vehicles and library materials in the amount of \$1,328,957.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

The financial statement's focus is on both the County as a whole (government-wide) and on the major individual funds. Both perspectives (government-wide and major fund) allow the user to address relevant questions, broaden a basis for comparison (year to year or government to government) and enhance the County's accountability.

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the County's basic financial statements, which are comprised of three components: 1) government-wide financial statements, 2) fund financial statements and 3) notes to the financial statements.

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the County's finances, in a manner similar to a private-sector business. The focus is on "activities", rather than "fund types".

The Statement of Net Assets presents information on all of the County's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net assets. The focus of the statement of net assets (the "unrestricted net assets") is designed to be similar to bottom line results for the County and its governmental activities. This statement combines and consolidates governmental fund current resources (short-term spendable resources) with capital assets and long-term obligations. Over time, the increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the County is improving or deteriorating.

The Statement of Activities presents information showing how the County's net assets changed during the most recent fiscal year, focusing on both the gross and net costs of various activities that are supported by the government's general tax and other revenues. This is intended to summarize and simplify the user's analysis of the cost of various governmental services.

Both of the government-wide financial statements distinguish functions of the County that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities) from other functions. The governmental activities of the County include general government, court system, law enforcement, county jail, emergency medical services, emergency management functions, solid waste services, road and street improvements and recreation projects.

The government-wide financial statements include only Union County, Florida, which is known as the primary government. The County has one component unit, which is the Union County Special Library District. The Library District (Public Library) is included as a separate non-major governmental fund in the statements that follow this discussion.

The government-wide financial statements can be found following this discussion.

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over the resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The County, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements. All of the funds of the County can be divided into two categories: governmental funds and fiduciary funds. Traditional users of governmental financial statements will find the fund financial statements presentation more familiar.

Governmental Funds

Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spending resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating the County's near-term financing requirements.

Governmental Funds (continued)

Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long-term impact of the County's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund Balance Sheet and the governmental fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities. Information is presented separately in the governmental fund Balance Sheet and in the governmental fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances for the major funds. Information is presented for the non-major funds in the Combining Balance Sheet and Combining Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances.

The County adopts an annual appropriated budget for all of its governmental funds, as required by state law. The County has five major governmental funds. A listing and description of the major funds is provided in the notes to financial statements. Budgetary comparison statements have been provided for the major funds to demonstrate compliance with the budget. In addition, the financial statements provide budget to actual comparisons for the non-major funds.

Fiduciary Funds

Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of parties outside the County. Fiduciary funds are not reflected in the government-wide financial statements because the resources of those funds are not available to support the County's own programs. The accounting used for fiduciary funds is much like that used for governmental funds. The County's main fiduciary activity is the accounting for agency funds. The County collects monies for property taxes, traffic fines and other monies to be remitted to other governmental agencies.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. They can be found following this discussion.

Approximately 84% percent of the County's net assets reflect its investment in capital assets (e.g. land, buildings, improvements, infrastructure, vehicles and equipment) less any related debt used to acquire those assets that is still outstanding. The County uses these assets to provide services to its citizens; consequently, these assets are not available for future spending. Although the County's investment in its capital assets is reported net of related debt, it should be noted that the resources needed to repay this debt must be provided from other sources, since the capital assets themselves cannot be used to liquidate these liabilities.

Of the remaining balance, \$613,668 is unrestricted net assets that may be used to meet the County's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors and \$1,883,275 is restricted net assets that are constrained by grant agreements, Florida Statutes or enabling legislation.

At September 30, 2012, the County is able to report positive balances in all three categories of net assets.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE COUNTY'S FUNDS

As noted earlier, the County uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance related legal requirements.

Governmental Funds

The focus of the County's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the County's financing requirements.

As of September 30, 2012, the County's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$3,151,301, a decrease of \$148,456 in comparison with the prior year. Of the ending fund balance, \$869,074 is considered unassigned and can be spent at the discretion of the Board, \$13,263 is considered nonspendable to account for ending inventory, \$92,555 is assigned for public safety related activities and \$2,176,409 is considered restricted, which represents the ending fund balances of the County's special revenue funds and unspent clerk appropriations from the Justice Administration Commission and IV-D grant reimbursements.

The General Fund is the chief operating fund of the County. At September 30, 2012, the unassigned fund balance of the General Fund was \$869,074. As a measure of the General Fund's liquidity, it may be useful to compare both unassigned fund balance and total fund balance to total fund expenditures. Unassigned fund balance represents 15% of total General Fund expenditures. As of September 30, 2012, the fund balance of the General Fund decreased by \$288,841 when compared to the prior fiscal year ending fund balance. This decrease is due to the General Fund's earnings not being sufficient to cover transfers out.

The Local Housing Assistance Fund is used to account for revenues and expenditures associated with repairing low and moderate income homes. Also, the funds can be used to assist with down payments in purchasing new homes. During the current fiscal year the fund balance of the Local Housing Assistance Fund increased by \$134. This fund has a positive ending fund balance of \$240.

The Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Fund is used to account for revenues and expenditures related to ambulance services for county residents. During the current fiscal year the Emergency Medical Service's fund balance increased by \$239,069. The increase can be attributed to a transfer from the general fund. The ending fund balance of the EMS Fund was \$378,543.

The Special Law Enforcement Trust Fund is used to account for revenues and expenditures associated with the collection of forfeitures used to improve the County's Sheriff Department. The Special Law Enforcement Trust fund balance increased during the fiscal year by \$50,219. This increase is attributed to no expenditures being made during the fiscal year. The Special Law Enforcement Fund had an ending fund balance of \$962,184.

The Transportation Trust Fund is used to account for all revenues and expenditures for the County's transportation system. This fund is also responsible for the purchasing and tracking of inter county fuel. During the fiscal year, the fund balance of the Transportation Trust Fund decreased \$19,142 primarily due to decreased transfers received from the Five-Cent Gas Tax Fund. The fund balance in the Transportation Trust Fund was \$108,633 at year end.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE COUNTY'S FUNDS (continued)

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

Significant variations between original and final budget amounts were due to revenues received that were unanticipated in the original budget and the associated expenditures.

Significant variations between the final budget and actual amounts related to a budget amendment done to record unanticipated grant revenue and related expenditures in the amount of \$500,000; however only \$120,329 of actual grant expenditures occurred during the year.

Capital Assets

The County's investment in capital assets for its governmental type activities as of September 30, 2012 amounted to \$14,151,267 (net of accumulated depreciation). This investment in capital assets includes land, buildings and improvements, infrastructure, vehicles and equipment.

Major capital assets added during the current fiscal year included the following:

- The County entered into a capital lease for a Caterpillar 12M2 Motor Grader with a value of \$205,819.
- The County completed resurfacing NE/SE 8th Avenue. Current year costs were \$121,046.
- The Solid Waste department purchased a 2012 Mack Roll-off truck in the amount of \$106,472.
- A new ambulance was purchased by Emergency Medical Services for a total cost of \$149,960.

Long-Term Debt

At the end of the current fiscal year, the County had total debt outstanding of \$1,629,819 which consists of \$672,700 in notes payable used by the various governmental funds, \$341,774 in landfill long-term closure costs, \$376,995 in accrued compensated absences for the County and \$238,350 in capital lease obligations.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of Union County, Florida (the County) conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the more significant policies.

Reporting Entity/Legal Authority

The Board of County Commissioners is the legislative and governing body of Union County, Florida. It operates under a non-charter form of government pursuant to the authority provided in the Constitution of the State of Florida and consists of five elected officials. Union County was established by Chapter 8516, Laws of Florida in 1921. The Clerk of the Circuit Court serves as Clerk to the Board pursuant to Section 125.17, Florida Statutes.

The County uses the criteria established in GASB Statement No. 14 to define the reporting entity and identify component units. The Union County Special Library District is considered a component unit of Union County, Florida. The Special Library District's financial transactions have been blended into the County's financial statements as a Special Revenue Fund, titled *Public Library*. The Board of County Commissioners established the Special Library District in July 1988, by adopting Ordinance 88-03. The Special Library District was created under the authority granted by Florida Statute Section 125.01.

The Board of County Commissioners and the offices of the Clerk of the Circuit Court, Sheriff, Tax Collector, Property Appraiser, and Supervisor of Elections are operated as separate County agencies in accordance with applicable provisions of Florida Statutes. The offices of the Sheriff, Property Appraiser, and Supervisor of Elections operate on a budget system, whereby County-appropriated funds are received from the Board of County Commissioners, and any unexpended appropriations are required to be returned to the Board of County Commissioners at the end of the fiscal year. The Clerk's duties as Clerk to the Board, Clerk of the County Court, and Chief Financial Officer for the County are budgeted functions, funded by the Board. The Clerk's duties as Clerk of the Circuit Court are funded by fees collected by that office. The Tax Collector's salary and benefits are funded by the Board; all other expenditures are funded by fees collected by that office. Excess fees of the Tax Collector are returned to the Board at the end of the fiscal year.

Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements (i.e., the Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities) concentrate on the County as a whole. In addition, they report information on all of the non-fiduciary activities of the County. For the most part, the effect of inter-fund activity has been removed from these statements. *Governmental activities*, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are separate from *business-type activities*, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for support.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses, of a given function or segment, are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services or privileges provided by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported instead as general revenues.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Government-Wide and Fund Financial Statements (concluded)

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary funds even though the latter are excluded from the government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

GASB Statement No. 34, *Basic Financial Statements and Management Discussion and Analysis for State and Local Governments*, sets forth minimum criteria for the determination of major funds. The non-major funds are combined in one column in the fund financial statements.

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the County are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund balance, revenues, and expenditures. Government resources are allocated to, and accounted for in, individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

The accounting and financial reporting treatment is determined by the applicable measurement focus and the basis of accounting. The basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. The basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied. Measurement focus indicates the type of resources being measured such as current financial resources (current assets less current liabilities) or economic resources (all assets and liabilities).

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the *economic resources* measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting, as are the fiduciary fund financial statements. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year for which they are levied. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Governmental fund financial statements are reported using the *current financial resources measurement focus* and the *modified accrual basis of accounting*. Revenues are recognized as soon as they are both measurable and available. Revenues are considered to be available when they are collectible within the current period or soon enough thereafter to pay liabilities of the current period. For this purpose, the County considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 90 days of the end of the current fiscal period.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting (concluded)

Property taxes, special assessments, intergovernmental revenues, charges for services, licenses and interest associated with the current fiscal period are all considered to be susceptible to accrual and so have been recognized as revenues of the current fiscal period. All other revenue items are considered to be measurable and available only when cash is received by the County.

Expenditures generally are recorded when a liability is incurred, as under accrual accounting. However, debt service expenditures, as well as expenditures related to compensated absences and claims and judgments, are recorded only when payment is due.

The County reports the following major governmental funds:

General Fund - The General fund is the general operating fund of the County. It is used to account for all financial resources, except those required to be accounted for in another fund. Additionally, with the adoption of GASB 54 "Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions," the general fund also accounts for activities related to the County's building department and the general fund of each constitutional officer.

Local Housing Assistance Trust Fund - The Local Housing Assistance Trust fund (a special revenue fund) is used to account for the proceeds of State Housing Initiative Partnership grant (SHIP) revenues which provides emergency repairs for residences and down payment assistance for home buyers. Participants must be Union County residents and meet low and moderate income guidelines.

Emergency Medical Services - The Emergency Medical Services fund (a special revenue fund) is used to account for ambulance and emergency medical assistance to Union County residents.

Special Law Enforcement Trust Fund - The Special Law Enforcement Trust fund (a special revenue fund) is used to account for the proceeds of forfeitures collected by the County and used to enhance the County's Sheriff Department.

Transportation Trust Fund – The Transportation Trust Fund is used to account for all revenues and expenditures for the County's transportation system.

The County reports the following other fund type:

Agency Funds - Agency funds are used to account for assets held by the County in a custodial or trustee capacity (assets equal liabilities). Agency funds do not involve the measurement of results of operations.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Assets, Liabilities and Fund Equity

Cash and Equivalents and Investments

The institutions in which the County's monies are deposited are certified as a "Qualified Public Depository," as required under the Florida Public Deposits Act. This law requires every qualified public depository to deposit with the State Treasurer eligible collateral equal to or in excess of an amount to be determined by the State Treasurer and requires the State Treasurer to ensure that funds are entirely collateralized throughout the fiscal year. Therefore, the County's total deposits are insured by the Federal Depository Insurance Corporation and the Bureau of Collateral Securities, Division of Treasury, State Department of Insurance.

Receivables

Accounts receivable in the amount of \$456,881 in the Emergency Medical Services Fund consists of receivables for ambulance services provided to private individuals and the State. Of this amount, \$393,447 is reported for ambulance services provided to private individuals, which is net of an allowance for uncollectible accounts of \$100,000. This allowance represents approximately 18% of the gross ambulance service accounts receivable at September 30, 2012. The remaining balance of \$63,434 is receivable from the State for ambulance services and is deemed to be 100% collectible. The County also reported \$33,519 as accounts receivable in other funds. On the Statement of Net Assets, net internal balances of the County's agency funds in the amount of \$24,853 are reported in accounts receivable.

Inventory

Inventory is valued at cost, using the first-in/first-out (FIFO) method. The cost of governmental fund-type inventory is recorded as expenditures when purchased. Fund balance is nonspendable for the inventory on hand, at the end of the fiscal year.

Capital Assets and Long-Term Liabilities

Because of the current financial resources measurement focus, the accompanying fund financial statements do not report capital assets or long-term liabilities. Such amounts are instead reported in the government-wide financial statements of the County. However, details of capital assets and long-term liabilities related to the Board are disclosed in these financial statements.

Current acquisitions of fixed assets are valued at historical cost. Capital assets must have a useful life of more than one year and an original cost of at least \$1,000. However, to a large extent, reported values are based on estimated historical cost, because actual historical cost information was not always available for older assets. Donated fixed assets are valued at their estimated fair value, on the date donated. Property, plant and equipment is depreciated using the straight-line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Assets, Liabilities and Fund Balance (concluded)

Accounts Payable

Accounts payable balances are primarily payable to third-party vendors for goods provided and services rendered.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make various estimates. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Compensated Absences

The various County agencies maintain policies that permit employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation and sick pay benefits that will be paid to employees upon separation of service if certain criteria are met. These benefits, plus their related tax and retirement costs, are classified as compensated absences. The policies of the various County agencies vary as to the amount and the vesting of employee vacation leave time and in some instances sick time. The amount of vacation time is determined by the period of employment.

Fund Balance

The County does not have a formal written policy regarding whether restricted or unrestricted amounts are considered to be spent when an expenditure for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balances are available. However, it has been the County's general practice when expenditure is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted fund balance is available; the County considers restricted funds to have been spent first. When expenditure is incurred for which assigned or unassigned fund balances are available, the County considers amounts to have been spent first out of assigned funds then unassigned funds, as needed.

Property Taxes

Property tax revenues are recognized when levied, to the extent that they result in current receivables. Details of the property tax calendar are presented below:

Note 2 - Investments

Florida Statutes authorize the County to invest in bonds, notes or other obligations of the U.S. Government, certificates of deposits, repurchase agreements, certain bonds of any State or local government unit and the State Treasurer's Investment Pool. At September 30, 2012 the County's investments totaled \$723,628 and are invested in certificate of deposits held with qualified public depositories.

Interest Rate Risk. The Office does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

Concentration of Credit Risk. The Office places no limit on the amount the Office may invest in any one issuer.

Note 5 - Risk Management

The County purchased insurance to limit the exposure of the following risks of loss, theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; natural disasters and injuries to employees. Commercial insurance has also been purchased by the County to cover the risks of loss due to employee errors or omissions and health insurance. Settled claims, resulting from these risks, have not exceeded insurance coverage in any of the past three years.

Note 6- Commitment/Contingencies

The County participates in state and federally assisted grant programs, which may be subject to future program compliance audits by the grantors.

The total interest incurred for the year ended September 30, 2012 was \$43,445.

Note 8 - Landfill Long-Term Care Costs

The State of Florida requires the County to monitor its closed landfill. Monitoring includes periodic testing of groundwater over the next 5 years. If the groundwater is contaminated by the landfill, then the County must take steps to remedy the situation. Costs of monitoring wells and landfill groundwater, of approximately \$68,355 per year, are expected to be incurred for a period of approximately 5 years. Actual costs may be higher or lower, depending on inflation, changes in technology or changes in regulations. The County's engineers calculate the annual cost of long-term care.

The County is required to deposit the annual estimate in a separate fund to pay for these costs. The County carried over cash of \$107,415 from fiscal year ending September 30, 2011 to fiscal year ending September 30, 2012. During the fiscal year, the County deposited \$15,040 into the landfill escrow account and expended \$52,117 related to monitoring costs.

Note 9 - Pension Plan

Plan Description. The County contributes to the Florida Retirement System ("System"), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Florida, Department of Management Services, Division of Retirement. The System provides retirement, disability or death benefits to retirees or their designated beneficiaries. Chapter 121, Florida Statutes, establishes the authority for benefit provisions. Changes to the law can only occur through an act of the Florida Legislature. The System issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the System. That report may be obtained by writing to the Florida Retirement System, PO Box 9000, Tallahassee, Florida 32315-9000, or by calling (850) 488-6491.

Funding Policy. The County and plan members are required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. Employer contribution rates of the County applicable to wages earned, as follows:

Employee contribution rates are 3% of applicable wages earned. The contribution requirements of plan members and the County are established and may be amended by the Florida Legislature. The County's contributions to the System for the years ended September 30, 2012, 2011, and 2010 were \$328,504, \$487,451 and \$512,539, respectively, and are equal to the required contributions for each year.

Note 10 - Jointly Governed Organizations

New River Public Library Cooperative

The governments of Baker, Bradford and Union Counties established the New River Public Library Cooperative (the Cooperative) through an interlocal agreement, executed in 1996. The Cooperative was established to provide a single library administrative unit for the citizens of the tri-county region, in order to provide free library service to its residents. The Cooperative is governed by a Board of Directors, whose members are appointed by each participating government. The Board of Directors has control over the budgeting and financing of the Cooperative.

Note 10 - Jointly Governed Organizations (concluded)

New River Public Library Cooperative (concluded)

The Board received from New River Public Library Cooperative \$12,000, in rental charges, in fiscal year 2011-2012. The charges include the cost of office space and utilities provided by Union County.

The governments of Baker, Bradford and Union Counties established the New River Solid Waste Association (the Association) through an interlocal agreement, executed on July 5, 1988. The Association was established to provide a regional approach to solid waste management for the citizens of the tri-county region, without regard to political or governmental boundaries, in order to promote and protect the public health, welfare and safety of the citizens. The Association is governed by a Board of Directors, whose members are appointed by each participating government. The Board of Directors has control over the budgeting and financing of the Association.

The Board incurred \$182,838 in solid waste tipping charges, during fiscal year 2012. The charges are based on the amount of solid waste taken into the landfill from Union County and its residents. The Board received \$382,486 from the New River Solid Waste Association in revenue sharing, host and assessment fees. Budget over expenditures were caused by unanticipated revenue in the form of grants and debt proceeds that required budget amendments to expend, however no such amendments were executed.

Note 12 – Fund Balances

Beginning with fiscal year 2011, the County implemented GASB Statement No. 54, "Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions." This statement provides more clearly defined fund balance categories to make the nature and extent of the constraints placed on a government's fund balances more transparent. The following classifications describe the relative strength of applicable spending constraints:

The County reported \$92,555 in assigned fund balance which relates to residual General Fund transfers made to Emergency Management; which the Board intends to be spent on emergency management (public safety) related activities.

Management Letter

The Honorable County Commissioners Union County, Florida

We have audited the financial statements of Union County, Florida (the "County"), as of and for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2012, and have issued our report thereon dated June 14, 2013. We have also issued reports on internal control and on compliance and other matters which should be considered in conjunction with this management letter.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Additionally, our audit was conducted in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General, which govern the conduct of local governmental entity audits performed in the State of Florida and require that certain items be addressed in this letter.

Prior Audit Findings

The Rules of the Auditor General require that we comment as to whether or not corrective actions have been taken to address significant findings and recommendations made in the preceding audit. In that regard, prior year finding 11-03 is repeated in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as finding 12-01. Prior audit findings 11-01 and 11-02 have been corrected.

Financial Condition

As required by the Rules of the Auditor General, the scope of our audit included a review of the provisions of Section 218.503, Florida Statutes, "Determination of Financial Emergency". In connection with our audit, we determined that the County has not met one or more of the conditions described in Section 218.503(1), Florida Statutes.

Also, as required by the Rules of the Auditor General, we applied financial condition assessment procedures, as of the end of the fiscal year, pursuant to Rule 10.556(7). It is management's responsibility to monitor financial condition, and our financial condition assessment was based in part on representations made by management and the review of financial information provided by management. The application of such procedures did not reveal evidence of a "deteriorating financial condition" as that term is defined in Rule 10.554.

Annual Financial Report

As required by the Rules of the Auditor General, the scope of our audit included a review of the provisions of Section 218.415, Florida Statutes, regarding the investment of public funds. Our audit disclosed no instances of noncompliance with the provision of Section 218.415, Florida Statutes.

Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters

The Honorable County Commissioners Union County, Florida

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of Union County, as of and for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2012, which collectively comprise Union County's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated June 14, 2013. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the County's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the County's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the County's internal control over financial reporting.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses and therefore, there can be no assurance that all deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses have been identified. However, as described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses and significant deficiencies.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We consider finding 12-07 described in the accompanying Schedule of findings and Questioned Costs to be a material weakness.

A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We consider findings 12-01 and 12-04 described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs to be significant deficiencies.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the County's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and which are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as findings 12-02, 12-03, 12-05, 12-06 and 12-08.

We also noted certain matters that we reported in separately issued reports for the County's constitutional officers.

The County's response to the findings identified in our audit is described in the accompanying letter of response. We did not audit the County's letter of response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

Communication with Those Charged with Governance

Professional standards require that we provide you with the following information related to our audit.

Our Responsibility Under U.S. Generally Accepted Auditing Standards

As stated in our engagement letter, our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to express an opinion about whether the financial statements prepared by management with your oversight are fairly presented, in all material respects. Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you of your responsibilities.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We performed the audit according to the planned scope and timing.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. During the year, there were no new accounting policies adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the year. We noted no transactions entered into during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. Sensitive disclosures effecting the financial statements were management's estimate for allowance for uncollectible accounts, current portion of compensated absences long-term debt and capital asset useful lives.

The disclosures in the financial statements are neutral, consistent and clear. There are no particularly sensitive disclosures significantly affecting the financial statements.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known or likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Misstatements were corrected by audit adjustments and have been provided to management for posting to the County's books.

Disagreements with Management

For the purpose of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a financial accounting, reporting or audit matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated June 14, 2013.

Management Consultations with Other Independent Accountants

In some cases, management may decide to consult with other accountants about auditing and accounting matters, similar to obtaining a "second opinion" on certain situations. If a consultation involves application of an accounting principle to the governmental unit's financial statements or a determination of the type of auditor's opinion that may be expressed on those statements, our professional standards require the consulting accountant to check with us to determine that the consultant has all the relevant facts. To our knowledge, there were no such consultations with other accountants.

Other Audit Findings or Issues

We generally discuss a variety of matters, including the application of accounting principles and auditing standards, with management each year prior to retention as the governmental unit's auditors. However, these discussions occurred in the normal course of our professional relationship and our responses were not a condition to our retention.

Report on Compliance with Requirements That Could Have a Direct and Material Effect on each State Project and on Internal Control over Compliance in Accordance with the State Projects Compliance Supplement and Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General

Compliance

We have audited Union County's compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the requirements described in the State Projects Compliance Supplement that could have a direct and material effect on each of the County's major state projects for the year ended September 30, 2012. The County's major state projects are identified in the summary of auditors' results section of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to each of its major state projects is the responsibility of Union County's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the County's compliance based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the *State Projects Compliance Supplement*, and Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General. Those standards, the *State Projects Compliance Supplement* and Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major state project occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the County's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures, as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. Our audit does not provide a legal determination on Union County's compliance with those requirements.

In our opinion, Union County complied, in all material respects, with the compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major state projects for the year ended September 30, 2012. However, the results of our auditing procedures disclosed an instance of noncompliance with those requirements, which is required to be reported in accordance with Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General, and which is described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs as item 12-09.

Internal Control Over Compliance

The management of Union County is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to state projects. In planning and performing our audit, we considered Union County's internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major state project in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on compliance and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with the *State Projects Compliance Supplement* and Chapter 10.550, Rules of the Auditor General, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the County's internal control over compliance.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a state project on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a state project will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above. However, we identified a deficiency in internal control over compliance that we consider to be a significant deficiency as described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as finding 12-09. A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a state project is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

The County's response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying letter of response. We did not audit the County's response and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the County and its management and oversight agencies, and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than these specified parties.

PART II - FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS

12-01 - Internal Controls over Fuel Inventory

Type of Finding: Significant Deficiency in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u>: Controls over in-house fuel usage are insufficient to ensure proper reporting of inventory balances. Attempts to reconcile the physical fuel inventory to the perpetual fuel inventory results in unexplainable discrepancies. In fact, reconciliation attempts have resulted in ending balances being greater than the capacity of the fuel tanks. As a result, tax returns for refund of state fuel taxes could not be completed, resulting in loss of revenue for the County. This finding is repeated from the 2011 audit.

<u>Recommendation</u>: It may be necessary for the County to reconsider its options for maintaining a fuel inventory.

12-02 - Budget Amendments

Type of Finding: Compliance

<u>Condition</u>: Budgets may be amended for unanticipated receipts, such as debt proceeds or grants. Florida Statutes 129.06 and 129.07 govern the execution and amendment of the budget and stipulate that it is unlawful to expend in any fiscal year more than the amount budgeted in each fund's budget. During the year, the Transportation Trust Fund, Solid Waste Fund and Emergency Management Fund each incurred unanticipated revenue in the form of debt proceeds or grants that required a budget amendment in order to expend those funds; however, no budget amendments were done.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Budget versus actual expenditure reports should be reviewed on a monthly basis to serve as an indicator of additional funding received that was not in the original budget.

12-03 - Physical Inventory of Property

Type of Finding: Compliance

<u>Condition</u>: Pursuant to 69I-73.006, F.A.C., each governmental unit shall ensure that a complete physical inventory of all property is taken annually. The Board of County Commissioners has the responsibility of recording all property with a value or cost of \$1,000 or more and projected useful life of 1 year or more in the local government's financial system. While the County is maintaining current year additions, a physical inventory was not performed for the year under audit.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We suggest that a physical inventory of property be taken every fiscal year to comply with the Florida Administrative Code.

12-04 - Financial Statement Preparation

Type of Finding: Significant Deficiency in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u>: For the year ended September 30, 2012, the County relied upon the external independent audit firm to prepare financial statements compliant with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles promulgated by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We suggest that the costs of resources to produce internally prepared U.S. GAAP financial statements be researched and considered.

12-05 - Budget Transparency

Type of Finding: Compliance

<u>Condition</u>: Effective October 1, 2011, Florida Statute 129.03(3)(c) was amended to require Counties to post tentative and final budgets on the County's official website to promote transparency. Research revealed that the County's main website appears to be the Clerk's website which had the 2009-10 budgets posted, however the 2011-12 budget could not be found.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that the County post the tentative budget, final budget and related amendments made during the year on the County's official website to comply with Florida Statutes.

12-06 - Pledged Collateral

Type of Finding: Compliance

<u>Condition</u>: The County entered into a loan agreement with Kansas Bank for the purchase of a roll-off truck. The financing agreement granted a security interest in the truck which is unlawful under the State Constitution. Counties are allowed to pledge non-ad valorem tax revenue to secure an asset, but not the asset itself.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We suggest that all future loan agreements pledge non-ad valorem revenue sources as collateral rather than a security interest in County's equipment or assets.

12-07 - EMS Accounts Receivable

Type of Finding: Material Weakness in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u>: The County utilizes an independent third party consulting company to assist in the billing and collection of emergency medical services provided to citizens. The consulting company provides monthly detailed statements showing billing and collection detail and ending balances still to be collected. Reconciliation of the third party detailed statement to the County's accounts receivable subsidiary and general ledger are not being performed in a timely or accurate manner.

<u>Recommendation</u>: Billing statements from the third party consulting company should be reconciled to the County's accounts receivable subsidiary ledger and general ledger each month.

12-08 – Contract with Health Department

Type of Finding: Compliance

<u>Condition</u>: A review of the annual contract between the County and the State of Florida Department of Health states that the County's contribution for such services is not to exceed \$25,000; however, amounts budgeted and paid have been greater than \$25,000.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that the County comply with the Health Department contract.

PART III-FINDINGS AND QUESTIONED COSTS-FEDERAL PROGRAMS AND STATE PROJECTS

12-09 - Emergency Management Grants

Condition: The County's Emergency Management Department was the recipient of an EMPG federal grant and EMPA state grant to assist in the funding of emergency management activities. Portions of claimed grant expenditures were for the Emergency Management Director's salary and benefits. Due to the nature and size of the County, the EMG Director performs dual roles as the 911 Director as well. Inquiries with the Director and County staff revealed that job functions, although overlapping at times, were split 50/50. Therefore, we question the claiming of 100% of the Director's wages and benefits to emergency management grant awards.

<u>Questioned Costs:</u> CFDA 97.067 EMPG Grant Approximately \$11,200

CFSA 52.008 EMPA Grant Approximately \$27,800

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that any future grant expenditures for Emergency Management Director's wages and benefits be limited to the percent of job functions performed as the EMG Director.

Summary Schedule of Prior Audit Findings For the Year Ended September 30, 2012 Union County, Florida

11-01 - Improper Reporting of Overtime Hours

Type of Finding: Compliance

<u>Condition</u>: The Federal Fair Labor Standards Acts is very specific in its definition of hours worked and it does not include vacation and sick hours for purposes of calculating overtime. During our review of personal services expenditures, we noted that at least one employee was reporting vacation and sick hours taken as actual hours worked. Consequently, overtime hours at 1.5 times the regular rate of pay was paid in error.

<u>Current Status</u>: Corrective action was taken immediately on the computation of overtime hours. We consider this finding to be fully resolved.

11-02 - Policy for Calculation of Overtime

Type of Finding: Significant Deficiency in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u>: Instances were noted where employees are being paid for payroll hours in excess of 40 per week (at the regular rate of pay) when vacation and sick leave hours taken cause total hours to exceed 40 per week. It is our understanding that the budget does not include funding for payment of payroll hours over 40 hours per week and hours worked in excess of 40 should reduce vacation and sick hours taken. The personnel policies do not address how payroll should be calculated when this situation occurs.

<u>Current Status</u>: Meetings were held with department heads to clarify the policy regarding overtime. We consider this finding to be fully resolved.

11-03 – Internal Controls over Fuel Inventory

Type of Finding-Significant Deficiency in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u>: Internal controls have been established for tracking of fuel gallons purchased, used and held in inventory; however such procedures were not being followed. Consequently, amounts reported in inventory at year-end were more gallons than the tanks actually hold. Due to these discrepancies, the County was not able to submit Quarterly Returns for Fuel Tax Refunds for the period ended September 30, 2011 and thereafter.

<u>Current Status</u>: This matter continues to be an issue and it is repeated as Finding 12-01 in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs.

12-01 Internal Controls over Fuel Inventory

We have gathered information to use a new fuel control system, and will be presenting a proposal to the Board for approval before the end of the current fiscal year.

12-02 Budget Amendments

New management has procedures in place to more closely monitor spending compared to budgets on a monthly basis.

12-03 Physical Inventory of Property

We have arranged to conduct a physical inventory before the end of the current fiscal year.

12-04 Financial Statement Preparation

We have hired staff with the ability to prepare financial statements compliant with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles promulgated by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board.

12-05 Budget Transparency

We are implementing changes to update the County's website to include the current year's budget, to be in compliance with Florida Statute 129.03(3)(c).

12-06 Pledged Collateral

Changes are being implemented to more closely monitor long-term debt agreements to ensure that they are in compliance with state statutes.

12-07 EMS Accounts Receivable

The third party consulting company experienced major staff changes, and was not getting information to staff on a timely basis. We have discussed this with the company, and they have resolved the problems. In the future, we will reconcile Accounts Receivable on a monthly basis.

12-08 Contract with Health Department

We will review and update the contract, and will ensure that it is followed.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Union County Clerk of the Circuit Court (the "Office") conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the more significant policies.

Reporting Entity

The Clerk of the Circuit Court is an elected constitutional officer, whose office is established by Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida and is governed by various provisions of state law. Union County, including the Office of the Clerk of the Circuit Court, was established by Chapter 8516, Laws of Florida in 1921.

The Office is an integral part of Union County, the reporting entity for financial reporting purposes.

Basis of Presentation

The Office's financial statements are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purpose of complying with the Rules of the Auditor General of the State of Florida (the Rules). In conformity with the Rules, the Office has not presented the government-wide financial statements, the reconciliations to the government-wide statements or management's discussion and analysis.

Fund Accounting

Accounts are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate for each fund type. Government resources are allocated to, and accounted for in, individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The focus of fund financial statements is on major funds, each displayed in a separate column.

The Office reports the following major governmental funds; there are no non-major governmental funds:

General Fund – The principal operating fund of the office. It is used to account for all financial resources, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Records Modernization Fund - The Records Modernization Fund is used to account for fees charged pursuant to Sections 28.24 and 28.37, Florida Statutes, and related expenditures to modernize the Public Records storage and retrieval system of the County.

Additionally, the Clerk of the Circuit Court reports the following fiduciary funds:

Agency Funds – Used to account for assets held by the Office as an agent for individuals, private organizations, other governments, and/or other funds. Agency funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of results of operations. The Clerk's Agency Funds are the General Agency Fund, Fines and Forfeiture Fund, Domestic Relations Fund and Registry of Court Fund.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2012 Union County Clerk of the Circuit Court (Continued)

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting

All governmental funds are accounted for on a spending or current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Their operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets and, accordingly, are said to present a summary of sources and uses of "available spendable resources" during a period.

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied. All governmental funds are accounted for using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Their revenues are recognized when they become measurable and available as net current assets.

Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related fund liability is incurred. However, principal and interest on general long-term debt are recognized when due.

Agency fund assets and liabilities are accounted for on the modified accrual basis of accounting.

Capital Assets and Long-Term Liabilities

Capital assets used by the Office are capitalized (recorded and accounted for) by the Union County Board of County Commissioners.

Because of their spending measurement focus, expenditure recognition for governmental fund types is limited to exclude amounts represented by non-current liabilities. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term amounts are not recognized as governmental fund type expenditures or fund liabilities. They are instead reported as liabilities on the financial statements of the county.

Cash

All cash is placed in a bank that qualifies as a public depository pursuant to the provisions of the Florida Security for Public Deposits Act. Every qualified public depository is required by this law to deposit with the State Treasurer eligible collateral equal to, or in excess of, an amount to be determined by the State Treasurer. The State Treasurer is required to ensure that all funds are entirely insured throughout the fiscal year.

Accounts Pavable

Accounts payable balances in the general fund are primarily to third-party vendors for goods provided and services rendered.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make various estimates. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2012 Union County Clerk of the Circuit Court (Continued)

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (concluded)

Fund Balance

Beginning with fiscal year 2011, the Office implemented GASB 54, "Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions". This statement provides more clearly defined fund balance categories to make the nature and extent of the constraints placed on a government's fund balances more transparent. At September 30, 2012, fund balances are classified as follows:

<u>Restricted</u> – amounts constrained to specific purposes by their providers (such as grantors and higher levels of government), through constitutional provisions or by enabling legislation. For the Office, ending fund balance in the general fund is comprised of IV-D grant reimbursements and unspent Justice Administration Commission appropriations that are restricted to meet general and court related operational expenditures respectively. Records Modernization fund balance is restricted to be used exclusively for additional clerk and court related operational needs and program enhancements.

Compensated Absences

The Office follows generally accepted accounting principles in accounting for accrued compensated absences. The Office allows limited vesting of unused employee leave time. Since the annual and sick leave liability is considered long-term, it is recorded in the government wide financial statements of the County. In the past, compensated absences have been paid out of the General Fund of the Office and this practice is expected to continue in the future. The Office kept compensated absence records for the hours earned, used and available. Gross additions and deletions for compensated absences were not determined, accordingly, only the net change in the accumulated value of compensated absences is shown for the current fiscal year.

Note 2 - Investments

Florida Statutes authorize the Office to invest in bonds, notes or other obligations of the U.S. Government, certificates of deposits, repurchase agreements, certain bonds of any State or local government unit and the State Treasurer's Investment Pool.

Interest Rate Risk. The Office does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

Concentration of Credit Risk. The Office places no limit on the amount the Office may invest in any one issuer. The Office had 100 percent of excess deposits in a checking account with one local financial institution.

Note 4- Risk Management

The County purchased commercial insurance to limit the exposure of the following risks of loss: theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; natural disasters and injuries to employees. Commercial insurance has been purchased by the Office to cover the risks of loss due to employee errors or omissions and health insurance. Settled claims resulting from all risks have not exceeded insurance coverage in any of the past three years.

Note 5 - Pension Plan

Plan Description. The Office contributes to the Florida Retirement System ("System"), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Florida, Department of Management Services, Division of Retirement. The System provides retirement, disability or death benefits to retirees or their designated beneficiaries. Chapter 121, Florida Statutes, establishes the authority for benefit provisions. Changes to the law can only occur through an act of the Florida Legislature. The System issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the System. That report may be obtained by writing to the Florida Retirement System, PO Box 9000, Tallahassee, Florida 32315-9000, or by calling (850) 488-6491.

Funding Policy. The Office and plan members are required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. Employer contribution rates of the Office are applicable to wages earned, as follows:

Employee contribution rates are 3% of applicable wages earned. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Office are established and may be amended by the Florida Legislature. The Office's contributions to the System for the years ended September 30, 2012, 2011, and 2010 were \$20,989, \$43,324 and \$46,680, respectively, and are equal to the required contributions for each year.

Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters/Communication With Those Charged with Governance

We have audited the special purpose financial statements of the Office of the Union County Clerk of Circuit Court as of and for the year ended September 30, 2012, and have issued our report thereon, dated June 6, 2013. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Union County Clerk of Circuit Court's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Clerk of Circuit Court's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Clerk of Circuit Court's internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies and therefore, material weaknesses or significant deficiencies may exist that were not identified. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified. We did identify one deficiency in internal control, described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings as item 12-02 that we consider to be a significant deficiency.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Union County Clerk of Circuit Court's special purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed one instance of noncompliance that is required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and which is described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings as item 12-01.

Communication with Those Charged with Governance

Professional standards require that we provide you with the following information related to our audit.

Our Responsibility Under U.S. Generally Accepted Auditing Standards

As stated in our engagement letter, our responsibility, as prescribed by professional standards, is to express an opinion about whether the financial statements prepared by management with your oversight are fairly presented, in all material respects. Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you of your responsibilities.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We performed the audit according to the planned scope and timing.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. We noted no transactions entered into during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about the past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. There were no estimates affecting the financial statements.

The disclosures in the financial statements are neutral, consistent and clear. Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statement users. There are no particularly sensitive disclosures significantly affecting the financial statements.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known or likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. There were no misstatements noted during the audit.

Disagreements With Management

For the purpose of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a financial accounting, reporting or audit matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated June 6, 2013.

12-01 Employee Bonuses

Type of Finding: Compliance

<u>Condition</u> – A recent law change to Florida Statute 215.425 stipulates that bonuses paid to employees must be paid from nontax revenues and nonstate-appropriated funds and should be based on work performance. Employee bonuses were paid from Board of County Commissioner appropriations; however it is not determinable from which BCC revenue source. Furthermore we noted that work performance evaluations of the Clerk's staff resulted in different ratings, however all employees received equal bonus payments.

Recommendation – We recommend adherence to Florida Statute 215.425.

12-02 Payroll Controls

Type of Finding: Significant Deficiency in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u> – We noted the following during the course of our audit:

- Overstatement of year-end comp time balances, which were subsequently paid
- Employees are not aware of their individual comp time balances
- Employees did not sign off on manual overrides to the time clock system
- Employees did not sign off on their time reported by the time clock system
- Employees were not aware of Employee Policy Manual revisions, effective 10/1/2011

<u>Recommendation</u> – To improve internal control over payroll, we recommend that compensatory time balances be tracked in the payroll accounting software and that the balances be printed on employee paycheck stubs. Additionally, we recommend that employees sign off on their time reported by the time clock system each pay period.

12-01 Employee Bonuses

Bonuses were paid under a prior administration. In the future, I will familiarize myself with Florida Statute 215.425 and make certain that all compensation paid to employees follows such statute.

These financial statements are the responsibility of the management of the Office. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these special purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2012 Union County Sheriff

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Union County Sheriff (the "Office") conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the more significant policies.

Reporting Entity

The Sheriff is an elected constitutional officer, whose office is established by Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida and is governed by various provisions of state law. Union County, including the Office of the Sheriff, was established by Chapter 8516, Laws of Florida in 1921.

The Office is an integral part of Union County, the primary government for financial reporting purposes.

Basis of Presentation

The Office's financial statements are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purpose of complying with the Rules of the Auditor General of the State of Florida (the Rules). In conformity with the Rules, the Office has not presented the government-wide financial statements, reconciliations to the government-wide financial statements or a management's discussion and analysis.

Fund Accounting

Accounts are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures. Government resources are allocated to, and accounted for in, individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

The Office reports the following major governmental funds; there are no nonmajor governmental funds:

Governmental Funds

General Fund - The principal operating fund of the office. It is used to account for all financial resources, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Special Revenue Fund - The Special Revenue Fund is used to account for the inmate welfare funds that are generated by phone commissions. The profits can only be spent for the benefit of the inmates.

Additionally, the Sheriff reports the following fund type:

Fiduciary Funds

Agency Funds - Agency Funds are used to account for assets held by the Office in a trustee capacity, or as an agent for individuals, private organizations, and other governments.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2012 Union County Sheriff (Continued)

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting

All governmental funds are accounted for on a current financial resources measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Their operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets and, accordingly, are said to present a summary of sources and uses of "available spendable resources" during a period.

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied. All governmental funds are accounted for using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Their revenues are recognized when they become measurable and available as net current assets.

Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related fund liability is incurred. However, principal and interest on general long-term debt are recognized when due.

Cash

All cash is placed in a bank that qualifies as a public depository pursuant to the provisions of the Florida Security for Public Deposits Act. Every qualified public depository is required by this law to deposit with the State Treasurer eligible collateral equal to, or in excess of, an amount to be determined by the State Treasurer. The State Treasurer is required to ensure that all funds are entirely insured throughout the fiscal year.

Capital Assets and Long-Term Liabilities

Because of the current financial resources measurement focus, the accompanying fund financial statements do not report capital assets or long-term liabilities. Such amounts are instead reported in the government wide financial statements of the county.

Capital assets are defined by the County, as items with an individual cost of \$1,000 or more and an estimated useful life of one year or more. Current acquisitions of general fixed assets are valued at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Donated fixed assets are valued at their estimated fair value on the date donated.

Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line basis over the following estimated useful lives:

Accounts Payable

Accounts payable balances in the general fund are primarily to third-party vendors for goods provided and services rendered.

Fund Balance

Beginning with fiscal year 2011, the Office implemented GASB 54, "Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions." This statement provides more clearly defined fund balance categories to make the nature and extent of the constraints placed on a government's fund balances more transparent. At September 30, 2012, fund balances of the governmental funds are classified as follows:

<u>Restricted</u> – amounts constrained to specific purposes by their providers (such as grantors and higher levels of government), through constitutional provisions or by enabling legislation. For the Office, Inmate Welfare funds are restricted to be disbursed to benefit inmates.

<u>Unassigned</u> - amounts to be spent at the discretion of the Office. In as much as the Sheriff is a county constitutional officer, any funds remaining in the general fund at the end of the fiscal year are returned to the Board of County Commissioners.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make various estimates. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Compensated Absences

The Office follows generally accepted accounting principles in accounting for accrued compensated absences. The Office allows limited vesting of unused employee leave time for full-time employees. Employees are allowed to accumulate a maximum of 320 hours of annual leave. In addition, any employee with ten years of full-time creditable service is entitled to be paid for 25% of his or her accrued sick leave, up to a maximum of 960 hours, upon separation from employment. Since the annual and sick leave liability is considered long-term, it is recorded in the government wide financial statements of the County. In the past, compensated absences have been paid out of the General Fund of the Office and this practice is expected to continue in the future. Gross additions and deletions for compensated absences were not determined, accordingly, only the net change in the accumulated value of compensated absences is shown for the current fiscal year.

Note 2 - Investments

Florida Statutes authorize the Office to invest in bonds, notes or other obligations of the U.S. Government, certificates of deposits, repurchase agreements, certain bonds of any State or local government unit and the State Treasurer's Investment Pool.

Interest Rate Risk. The Office does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising form increasing interest rates.

Concentration of Credit Risk. The Office places no limit on the amount the Office may invest in any one issuer. The Office had 100 percent of excess deposits in a checking account with one local financial institution.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2012 Union County Sheriff (Continued)

Note 3 - Deferred Compensation Plan

The Office offers its employees a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457. The plan, available to all of the Office's employees, permits them to defer a portion of their salary until future years. Participation in the plan is optional. During the fiscal year, employees contributed \$26,117 into the deferred compensation plan. The deferred compensation is not available to employees until termination, retirement, death or unforeseeable emergency. All amounts of compensation deferred under the plan, and all income attributable to those amounts, all property and rights are (until paid or made available to the employee or other beneficiary) exclusively held for employees.

Note 4 - Risk Management

The County purchased commercial insurance to limit the exposure of the following risks of loss: theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; natural disasters and injuries to employees. Commercial insurance has been purchased by the Office to cover the risks of loss due to employee errors or omissions and health insurance. Settled claims resulting from all risks have not exceeded insurance coverage in any of the past three years.

Note 7 - Pension Plan

Plan Description. The Office contributes to the Florida Retirement System ("System"), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Florida, Department of Management Services, Division of Retirement. The System provides retirement, disability or death benefits to retirees or their designated beneficiaries. Chapter 121, Florida Statutes, establishes the authority for benefit provisions. Changes to the law can only occur through an act of the Florida Legislature. The System issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the System. That report may be obtained by writing to the Florida Retirement System, PO Box 9000, Tallahassee, Florida 32315-9000, or by calling (850) 488-6491.

Funding Policy. The Office and plan members are required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. Employer contribution rates of the Office are applicable to wages earned, as follows:

Employee contribution rates are 3% of applicable wages earned. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Office are established and may be amended by the Florida Legislature. The Office's contributions to the System for the years ended September 30, 2012, 2011, and 2010 were \$90,514, \$135,603 and \$146,543, respectively, and are equal to the required contributions for each year.

Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters

We have audited the special purpose financial statements of the Office of the Union County Sheriff as of and for the year ended September 30, 2012, and have issued our report thereon, dated June 6, 2013. Our report on the financial statements included a paragraph explaining that the financial statements include only the financial activities of the Office and, accordingly, are not intended to be a complete presentation for Union County, the primary government for financial reporting purposes. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

Management of the Office is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Union County Sheriff's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Sheriff's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Sheriff's internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. No new accounting policies were adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the year. We noted no transactions entered into during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. There were no estimates affecting the financial statements.

The disclosures in the financial statements are neutral, consistent and clear. Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. There are no particularly sensitive disclosures significantly affecting the financial statements.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known or likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. There were no misstatements noted during the audit.

Disagreements with Management

For the purpose of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a financial accounting, reporting or audit matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction, that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. 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Independent Auditors' Report

These financial statements are the responsibility of the management of the Office. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these special purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As discussed in Note 1 to the financial statements, the accompanying financial statements have been prepared for the purpose of complying with the Rules of the Auditor General of the State of Florida. They include only the financial activity of the Office, which is an integral part of Union County, Florida, the primary government for financial reporting purposes.

In our opinion, the special purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the major fund and aggregate remaining fund information of the Office at September 30, 2012, and the changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued a report dated October 31, 2012 on our consideration of the Office's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* and should be considered in assessing the results of our audit.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the budgetary comparison information be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Notes to Financial Statements September 30, 2012 Union County Tax Collector

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Union County Tax Collector (the "Office") conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the more significant policies.

Reporting Entity

The Tax Collector is an elected constitutional officer, whose office is established by Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Florida and is governed by various provisions of state law. Union County, including the Office of the Tax Collector, was established by Chapter 8516, Laws of Florida in 1921.

The Office is an integral part of Union County, the reporting entity for financial reporting purposes.

Basis of Presentation

The Office's financial statements are special purpose financial statements that have been prepared for the purpose of complying with the Rules of the Auditor General of the State of Florida (the Rules). In conformity with the Rules, the Office has not presented the government-wide financial statements, the reconciliations to the government-wide statements or management's discussion and analysis.

Fund Accounting

Accounts are organized on the basis of funds, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate for each fund type. Government resources are allocated to, and accounted for in, individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The focus of fund financial statements is on major funds, each displayed in a separate column.

The Office reports the following major governmental fund; there are no non-major governmental funds:

General Fund - The principal operating fund of the office. It is used to account for all financial resources, except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Additionally, the Tax Collector reports the following fiduciary fund type:

Agency Fund - Used to account for assets held by the Office as an agent for individuals, private organizations, other governments, and/or other funds. Agency funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of results of operations. The Tax Collector's Agency Fund is used to account for the collection and distribution of property taxes, sales tax, vehicle tags and titles, boat registrations and titles, fishing licenses, and driver's licenses.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting

All governmental funds are accounted for on a spending or current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Their operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets and, accordingly, are said to present a summary of sources and uses of "available spendable resources" during a period.

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied. All governmental funds are accounted for using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Their revenues are recognized when they become measurable and available as net current assets.

Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related fund liability is incurred. However, principal and interest on general long-term debt are recognized when due.

Capital Assets and Long-Term Liabilities

Capital assets used by the Office are capitalized (recorded and accounted for) by the Union County Board of County Commissioners.

Because of their spending measurement focus, expenditure recognition for governmental fund types is limited to exclude amounts represented by non-current liabilities. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term amounts are not recognized as governmental fund type expenditures or fund liabilities. They are instead reported as liabilities on the financial statements of the county.

Cash

All cash is placed in a bank that qualifies as a public depository pursuant to the provisions of the Florida Security for Public Deposits Act. Every qualified public depository is required by this law to deposit with the State Treasurer eligible collateral equal to, or in excess of, an amount to be determined by the State Treasurer. The State Treasurer is required to ensure that all funds are entirely insured throughout the fiscal year.

Accounts Payable

Accounts payable balances, if any, in the general fund are primarily payable to third-party vendors for goods provided and services rendered.

Fund Balance

Beginning with fiscal year 2011, the Office implemented GASB 54, "Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions." This statement provides more clearly defined fund balance categories to make the nature and extent of the constraints placed on a government's fund balances more transparent. In as much as the Tax Collector is a county constitutional officer, any funds remaining at the end of the fiscal year are returned to the Board of County Commissioners.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (concluded)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make various estimates. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Compensated Absences

The Office follows generally accepted accounting principles in accounting for accrued compensated absences. The Office allows limited vesting of unused employee leave time. Since the annual and sick leave liability is considered long-term, it is recorded in the government wide financial statements of the County. In the past, compensated absences have been paid out of the General Fund of the Office and this practice is expected to continue in the future. The Office kept compensated absence records for the hours earned, used and available. Gross additions and deletions for compensated absences were not determined, accordingly, only the net change in the accumulated value of compensated absences is shown for the current fiscal year.

Note 2 - Investments

Florida Statutes authorize the Office to invest in bonds, notes or other obligations of the U.S. Government, certificates of deposits, repurchase agreements, certain bonds or any State or local government unit and the State Treasurer's Investment Pool.

Interest Rate Risk. The Office does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

Concentration of Credit Risk. The Office places no limit on the amount the Office may invest in any one issuer. The Office had 100 percent of excess deposits in a checking account with one local financial institution.

Note 4 - Risk Management

The County purchased commercial insurance to limit the exposure of the following risks of loss: theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; natural disasters and injuries to employees. Commercial insurance has been purchased by the Office to cover the risks of loss due to employee errors or omissions and health insurance. Settled claims resulting from all risks have not exceeded insurance coverage in any of the past three years.

Note 5 - Pension Plan

Plan Description. The Office contributes to the Florida Retirement System ("System"), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Florida, Department of Management Services, Division of Retirement. The System provides retirement, disability or death benefits to retirees or their designated beneficiaries. Chapter 121, Florida Statutes, establishes the authority for benefit provisions. Changes to the law can only occur through an act of the Florida Legislature. The System issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the System. That report may be obtained by writing to the Florida Retirement System, PO Box 9000, Tallahassee, Florida 32315-9000, or by calling (850) 488-6491.

Funding Policy. The Office and plan members are required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. Employer contribution rates of the Office are applicable to wages earned, as follows:

Employee contribution rates are 3% of applicable wages earned. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Office are established and may be amended by the Florida Legislature. The Office's contributions to the System for the years ended September 30, 2012, 2011, and 2010 were \$10,996, \$20,075 and \$21,704, respectively, and are equal to the required contributions for each year.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Union County Tax Collector's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Tax Collector's internal control over financial reporting. Their operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets and, accordingly, are said to present a summary of sources and uses of "available spendable resources" during a period.

Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting (concluded)

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied. All governmental funds are accounted for using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Their revenues are recognized when they become measurable and available as net current assets.

Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related fund liability is incurred. However, principal and interest on general long-term debt are recognized when due.

Capital Assets and Long-Term Liabilities

Capital assets used by the Office are capitalized (recorded and accounted for) by the Union County Board of County Commissioners.

Because of their spending measurement focus, expenditure recognition for governmental fund types is limited to exclude amounts represented by non-current liabilities. Since they do not affect net current assets, such long-term amounts are not recognized as governmental fund type expenditures or fund liabilities. They are instead reported as liabilities in the financial statements of the County.

Cash

All cash is placed in a bank that qualifies as a public depository pursuant to the provisions of the Florida Security for Public Deposits Act. Every qualified public depository is required by this law to deposit with the State Treasurer eligible collateral equal to, or in excess of, an amount to be determined by the State Treasurer. The State Treasurer is required to ensure that all funds are entirely insured throughout the fiscal year.

Accounts Payable

Accounts payable balances in the general fund are primarily payable to third-party vendors for goods provided and services rendered.

Fund Balance

Beginning with fiscal year 2011, the Office implemented GASB 54, "Fund Balance Reporting and Governmental Fund Type Definitions." This statement provides more clearly defined fund balance categories to make the nature and extent of the constraints placed on a government's fund balances more transparent. In as much as the Property Appraiser is a county constitutional officer, any funds remaining at the end of the fiscal year are returned to the Board of County Commissioners by reducing the subsequent year appropriation.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make various estimates. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Compensated Absences

The Office follows generally accepted accounting principles in accounting for accrued compensated absences. The Office allows limited vesting of unused employee leave time. Since the annual and sick leave liability is considered long-term, it is recorded in the government wide financial statements of the County. In the past, compensated absences have been paid out of the General Fund of the Office and this practice is expected to continue in the future. The Office kept compensated absence records for the hours earned, used and available. Gross additions and deletions for compensated absences were not determined, accordingly, only the net change in the accumulated value of compensated absences is shown for the current fiscal year.

Note 2 - Investments

Florida Statutes authorize the Office to invest in bonds, notes or other obligations of the U.S. Government, certificates of deposits, repurchase agreements, certain bonds of any State or local government unit and the State Treasurer's Investment Pool.

Interest Rate Risk. The Office does not have a formal investment policy that limits investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising form increasing interest rates.

Concentration of Credit Risk. The Office places no limit on the amount the Office may invest in any one issuer. The Office had 100 percent of excess deposits in a checking account with one local financial institution.

Note 4 - Risk Management

The County purchased commercial insurance to limit the exposure of the following risks of loss: theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; natural disasters and injuries to employees. Commercial insurance has been purchased by the Office to cover the risks of loss due to employee errors or omissions and health insurance. Settled claims resulting from all risks have not exceeded insurance coverage in any of the past three years.

Note 5 - Budget Overexpenditures

Even though excess funds were returned to the Board of County Commissioners, actual expenditure were greater than budgeted expenditures by \$333. This was primarily due to failure to amend the budget to allow for the expenditure of unanticipated revenues.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Union County Property Appraiser's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Property Appraiser's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Property Appraiser's internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, we consider deficiencies 12-01 and 12-02 described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Union County Property Appraiser's special purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and which are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings as item 12-03.

We noted no transactions entered into during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about the past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. There were no estimates affecting the financial statements.

The disclosures in the financial statements are neutral, consistent and clear. Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statement users. There are no particularly sensitive disclosures significantly affecting the financial statements.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known or likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. Schedule of Findings September 30, 2012 Union County Property Appraiser

12-01 Segregation of Duties – Material Weakness in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u> – Because of a limited number of available personnel, it is not always possible to adequately segregate certain incompatible duties. We noted that one employee has access to both physical assets and the relating accounting records. Consequently, the possibility exists that unintentional or intentional errors or irregularities could exist and not be promptly detected. This is a repeat finding from the 2011, 2010 and 2009 audits.

<u>Recommendation</u> – To the extent possible, given the availability of personnel, steps should be taken to separate employee duties so that no one individual has access to both physical assets and the related accounting records, or to all phases of a transaction.

12-02 Controls Related to Payroll Procedures – Material Weakness in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u> – A review of internal control procedures relating to payroll processing revealed the statutory pay and retirement rates were not changed in the accounting software. Consequently, the Property Appraiser was underpaid for the fiscal year and the reported amount for retirement was overstated.

<u>Recommendation</u> – We recommend that the Office's internal control procedures be modified to promote increased monitoring, checks and balances, especially as it relates to payroll.

12-03 Budget Amendments – Noncompliance

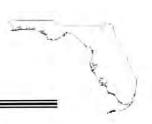
<u>Condition</u> – The Office received unanticipated revenues in the form of charges for services and miscellaneous revenues. Even though revenues exceeded expenditures and excess revenues were returned to the Board of County Commissioners, budget amendments must be approved in order to authorize the expenditure of unanticipated revenues.

<u>Recommendation</u> – We recommend that budget amendments be done for unanticipated revenue in order to authorize the expenditure of those funds.

Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Union County Supervisor of Elections (the "Office") conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governments. The following is a summary of the more significant policies.

Concentration of Credit Risk. The Office places no limit on the amount the Office may invest in any one issuer. The Office had 100 percent of excess deposits in a checking account with one local financial institution.

Note 4 - Risk Management

The County purchased commercial insurance to limit the exposure of the following risks of loss: theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; natural disasters and injuries to employees. Commercial insurance has been purchased by the Office to cover the risks of loss due to employee errors or omissions and health insurance. Settled claims resulting from all risks have not exceeded insurance coverage in any of the past three years.

Note 5 – Budget Overexpenditures

For the period ended September 30, 2012, the Office over expended its budget by a total of \$3,194. This was primarily due to a double reimbursement of grant expenditures from both the Board of County Commissioner and a state grant.

Note 6 - Pension Plan

Plan Description. The Office contributes to the Florida Retirement System ("System"), a cost-sharing multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by the State of Florida, Department of Management Services, Division of Retirement. The System provides retirement, disability or death benefits to retirees or their designated beneficiaries. Chapter 121, Florida Statutes, establishes the authority for benefit provisions. Changes to the law can only occur through an act of the Florida Legislature. The System issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the System. That report may be obtained by writing to the Florida Retirement System, PO Box 9000, Tallahassee, Florida 32315-9000, or by calling (850) 488-6491.

Funding Policy. The Office and plan members are required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. Employer contribution rates of the Office are applicable to wages earned, as follows:

Employee contribution rates are 3% of applicable wages earned. The contribution requirements of plan members and the Office are established and may be amended by the Florida Legislature. The Office's contributions to the System for the years ended September 30, 2012, 2011, and 2010 were \$11,693, \$18,836 and \$19,974, respectively, and are equal to the required contributions for each year.

Report on Internal Control over Financial Reporting and on Compliance and Other Matters/Communication With Those Charged with Governance

We have audited the special purpose financial statements of the Office of the Union County Supervisor of Elections as of and for the year ended September 30, 2012, and have issued our report thereon, dated June 10, 2013. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Union County Supervisor of Elections' internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinions on the financial statements but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Supervisor of Elections' internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Union County Supervisor of Elections' internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and would not necessarily identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses. However, we consider deficiencies 12-01 and 12-03 described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Union County Supervisor of Elections' special purpose financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under Government Auditing Standards and which are described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings as items 12-02 and 12-04.

Communication with Those Charged with Governance

Professional standards require that we provide you with the following information related to our audit.

Our Responsibility Under U.S. Generally Accepted Auditing Standards

As stated in our engagement letter, our responsibility, as described by professional standards, is to express an opinion about whether the financial statements prepared by management with your oversight are fairly presented, in all material respects. Our audit of the financial statements does not relieve you of your responsibilities.

Planned Scope and Timing of the Audit

We performed the audit according to the planned scope and timing.

Significant Audit Findings

Qualitative Aspects of Accounting Practices

Management is responsible for the selection and use of appropriate accounting policies. The significant accounting policies used are described in Note 1 to the financial statements. During the year, there were no new accounting policies adopted and the application of existing policies was not changed during the year. We noted no transactions entered into during the year for which there is a lack of authoritative guidance or consensus.

Accounting estimates are an integral part of the financial statements prepared by management and are based on management's knowledge and experience about past and current events and assumptions about future events. Certain accounting estimates are particularly sensitive because of their significance to the financial statements and because of the possibility that future events affecting them may differ significantly from those expected. There were no estimates affecting the financial statements.

The disclosures in the financial statements are neutral, consistent and clear. Certain financial statement disclosures are particularly sensitive because of their significance to financial statement users. There are no particularly sensitive disclosures significantly affecting the financial statements.

Difficulties Encountered in Performing the Audit

We encountered no significant difficulties in dealing with management in performing and completing our audit.

Corrected and Uncorrected Misstatements

Professional standards require us to accumulate all known or likely misstatements identified during the audit, other than those that are trivial, and communicate them to the appropriate level of management. We have provided your office with adjusting journal entries which you have agreed to post to the accounting records.

Disagreements with Management

For the purpose of this letter, professional standards define a disagreement with management as a financial accounting, reporting or audit matter, whether or not resolved to our satisfaction that could be significant to the financial statements or the auditor's report. We are pleased to report that no such disagreements arose during the course of our audit.

Management Representations

We have requested certain representations from management that are included in the management representation letter dated June 10, 2013.

Schedule of Findings September 30, 2012 Union County Supervisor of Elections

12-01 Segregation of Duties – Material Weakness in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u> – Because of a limited number of available personnel, it is not always possible to adequately segregate certain incompatible duties. We noted that one employee has access to both physical assets and the relating accounting records. Consequently, the possibility exists that unintentional or intentional errors or irregularities could exist and not be promptly detected. This is a repeat finding from the 2009, 2010 and 2011 audits.

<u>Recommendation</u> – To the extent possible, given the availability of personnel, steps should be taken to separate employee duties so that no one individual has access to both physical assets and the related accounting records, or to all phases of a transaction.

12-02 Budget Over Expenditures/Deficit Fund Balance - Noncompliance

<u>Condition</u> – For the year ended September 30, 2012, the Office has over expended its budget and, as a result, has reported a deficit fund balance. Pursuant to 129.201 and 129.202, Florida Statutes, the budget of the supervisor of elections shall be included by the board in the general county budget and is subject to the same provisions of laws as the county annual budget. Therefore, in conjunction with these provisions it is unlawful to exceed the budget. This is a repeat finding from the 2011 audit.

<u>Recommendation</u> – Section 129.201(9) states that the budget of the supervisor of elections may be increased by the board of county commissioners to cover expenses for emergencies and unanticipated expenses as are recommended and justified by the supervisor of elections. In instances where original budget appropriations do not cover expenditures, we recommend that the supervisor of elections follow this provision.

12-03 Controls Related to Payroll Procedures – Material Weakness in Internal Control

<u>Condition</u> – A review of internal control procedures relating to payroll processing revealed the following deficiencies:

- Time sheets contained mathematical errors
- Time sheets were not always complete and did not always support employee paychecks
- Hours for holidays and leave time were counted as hours worked for overtime calculations and consequently, employees were overpaid

This is a repeat finding from the 2011 audit.

<u>Recommendation</u> - We recommend that the Office's internal control procedures be modified to promote increased monitoring, checks and balances, especially as it relates to payroll.

12-04 Budget Amendments – Noncompliance

<u>Condition</u> – The Supervisor of Elections requested from the Board of County Commissioners a budget amendment in the amount of \$3,140 for voting machine equipment that was subsequently reimbursed from grant funds. This situation resulted in double recording of revenue.

<u>Recommendation</u> – The amount of \$3,140 should be returned to the Board of County Commissioners.

This letter is in response to the recent audit findings of the Union County Supervisor of Elections for the fiscal year ended September 30, 2012 that was conducted by DDF CPA Group.

12-01 Segregation of Duties

I understand the unique challenge this presents my office due to the limited amount of staff I have. I will continue to strive to make necessary changes to separate the basic accounting functions of my office.

12-02 Budget Over Expenditure/Deficit Fund Balance

Current over expenditure related to an adjustment needed at year end to report amount owed back to the Board of County Commissioner for funds I requested for new voting machines in December 2011, which were subsequent reimbursed by unanticapted grant funds in August 2012. In the future, I will ensure that this oversight will not occur when claiming grant expenditures.

12-03 Controls Related to Payroll Procedures

I will modify my internal contol procedures to promote increased monitoring and checks and balances.

12-04 Budget Amendments

In the future, I will prepare budget amendments for any unanticipated grant awards. The amount owed to the Board of County Commissioners will paid back out of current year appropriations.
